**Hypertensive emergencies: an update Paul E. Marik and ...**

One to two percent of patients with HTN develop acute elevations of blood pressure (hypertensive crises) that require medical treatment. However, only patients with true hypertensive emergencies require the immediate and controlled reduction of blood pressure with an intravenous antihypertensive agent. Recent findings: Although the mortality from hypertensive emergencies has decreased, the prevalence and demographics of this disorder have not changed over the last 4 decades.

**Hypertensive emergencies: an update**

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A hypertensive emergency is defined as an acute increase in BP associated with severe, potentially life-threatening target organ damage; in this condition, hospitalization, preferably in an ICU, is required for prompt BP control (minutes or a few hours) by intravenous administration of antihypertensive drugs (Table 1).

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Hypertensive emergency is defined as severely elevated blood pressure (BP) associated with new or progressive target organ dysfunction. Although the absolute value of the BP is not as important as the presence of end-organ damage, the systolic BP is usually >180 mmHg and/or the diastolic BP is >120 mmHg.

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The 2003 JNC 7 guidelines did comment on hypertensive emergencies.According to the JNC 7 guidelines, hypertensive emergency treatment should commence within the first hour and “[t]he severity of hypertensive crises is not related to the BP level but to the associated organ damage.” 31 The most frequent presenting symptoms of hypertensive emergency are cardiogenic pulmonary edema (31% of cases); stroke (22%); myocardial infarction (18%); aortic dissection (8%); acute renal failure (6% ...

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Purpose of review: Hypertensive emergency is defined as a systolic blood pressure > 180 mmHg or a diastolic blood pressure > 120 mmHg with evidence of new or progressive end-organ damage.
