## **MRSA - NHS**

In a study of 115 norovirus outbreaks in care homes, 12 were found to have been caused by a care worker; in three of these 12 cases, the care worker was symptomatic before coming on duty; in around half of the 115 outbreaks, the first case of infection was a resident who had been in the care home for more than four days (Curran et al, 2016).

MRSA in primary care: Summary Staphylococcus aureus (S. aureus) is a bacteria which colonises the skin, nose or gut of up to a third of the general population — it usually lives on intact skin harmlessly but can cause infection (most commonly skin, soft tissue, and bone infection) if invasion through the skin or deeper tissues occurs.

People taking care of patients suffering from MRSA infections should wear protective garments and follow strict hand hygiene procedures. Contaminated surfaces and laundry items of infected persons should be properly disinfected. Clean infected areas daily with hot water and soap to fight the infection and prevent it from spreading.
