Normal Newborn Nursery – Neonatal

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Neonatal care units (NICU) specialise in the care of those babies born before the normal gestational time 37 plus weeks, with prematurity ranging from 24 to 37 weeks and birth weights ranging from less than 1500 grams up to 2500 grams, many of which may have medical conditions that

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require specialised treatment and complex monitoring and continual supervision with a trained doctor available 24 hours daily.

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
