• Developmentally Appropriate Practice activities should be intentional, challenging, and achievable. • Recognizing and adapting practices based on the cultural background of each child is a Developmentally Appropriate Practice. • A child's age, personality, temperament, and family history are all factors that affect his/her development.

What is Developmentally Appropriate Practice?

Developmentally appropriate practice is important, because the healthy development in the early years is the foundation of child's future well-being and success. A child's healthy development in the physical, cognitive (mental), social, emotional and language areas depends on care and education that is positive and nurturing.

How Important Is Developmentally Appropriate Practice ...

Developmentally appropriate practice is an approach to teaching designed to promote optimum learning and development outcomes. This framework is grounded in the research on how young children develop and learn and examines the most effective teaching strategies in early education (NAEYC, n.d., "DAP").
